THE REFUGEE Tela CON JOURNEY



Flee country of origin to a relatively safe neighboring country or refugee camp.



Apply as a refugee and the UNHCR determines the best durable solution for each refugee family, then submit referrals to the U.S. or other eligible countries for potential resettlement.



Wait for application to be processed and for referrals to be submitted. The average wait time is 10-26 years.



Refugee families undergo RSC Africa Interviews/USCIS Interviews to demonstrate the applicant qualifies as a refugee. Extensive background checks are conducted.



Approved families then travel to the United States and are greeted by the local RST office. In the United States they will find a job, learn English, and integrate into the local community.



Referrals are approved for resettlement. Refugees receive cultural orientation and language training based on their resettlement location.



Applications are approved or denied and refugee families must complete medical examinations.





Flee country of origin to a relatively safe neighboring country or refugee camp.

There are currently over 79.5 million people forcibly displaced from their homes in the world.

The United States refugee resettlement program was at one time accepting refugees from over 13 different countries. Since the implementation of the travel ban and newest Presidential Determination, refugees from Syria and many other war stricken countries have been banned from entering the United States. Currently, the resettlement program is only seeing refugees from about 5 countries and Special Immigrant Visa holders from only Afghanistan.



Burma

Formerly a thriving agriculturally based country,
Burma is now considered one of the least developed
countries in the world. Religious tensions are high
between the majority of Buddhist Citizens and the
minority of Rohingya Muslims. These tensions and
their effects have created a massive refugee plight in
the region and into the United States.

Rohingya Population

The Rohingya Population in Burma is made up of a group of Sunni Muslims who primarily live in the Rakhine State of Burma. Religious differences led to tension between the minority Muslim Rohingya population and the rest of the majority Buddhist population of Burma caused the persecution of the Rohingya peoples.

Why Are People Fleeing?

Violence

Violence against the Rohingya peoples began to rise often in the form of public attacks furthering the insecurity of the Rohingya in Burma. Persecution

Includes the refusal of access to basic rights such as marriage, family planning, employment opportunities, education and the freedom of movement.



Eritrea

Eritrea has faced contention since the early 1960s when the country went to war with Ethiopia for its independence. After Eritrea's victory in 1993, the government became totalitarian. Therefore, despite being rich in natural resources; poor infrastructure and violence have resulted in the abuse and corruption of those resources.

Why Are People Fleeing?

Food Insecurity

Due to drought, soil erosion, overgrazing and the migration of struggling farmers, the number of families who are food insecure has risen.

Violence

The war with between Eritrea and Ethiopia has ended however, violent territorial disputes have not. This violence along the border of Ethiopia and Eritrea has displaced many individuals.

Restrictive Government Practices

Due to the countries current administration, there have been major restrictions on basic human rights and political freedom.

Iraq

Iraq is a country made up of many diverse peoples. However, the challenges posed by having a nation filled with people who have differing beliefs, along with the instability created by weak governances have caused many violent wars within the country. These wars have caused millions of Iraqi citizens to flee to other countries.


War

Over the past 30 years the country of Iraq has been involved in several violent conflicts and wars. These wars have made Iraq especially dangerous.

Persecution

In Iraq there has also been an ongoing and systematic persecution of the Kurdish peoples. The most extreme of these acts have included forced deportation and violence.

Democratic Republic of the Congo

DR Congo is a country abundant with resources however there are low levels of economic growth due to poor infrastructure. During the country's civil war, leaders from both sides (Hutu and Tutsi) used war and violence to distract attention away from the looting of the countries resources. Instability and violence have and continue to cause a massive amount of displacement, especially among the rural population.


Internal Displacement

There has been a huge migration of peoples from the volatile Eastern region moving into urban centers. This movement has caused overcrowding in urban cities, forcing people to leave the country.

Disease


Violence & War

Since the end of the civil war in the country, there has been ongoing violence, particularly in the rural areas of the Eastern region. This violence is due to poor infrastructure and an unstable government. There are over 100 factions hoping to gain control of the Eastern territory.

Afghanistan

There has been a long history of instability in Afghanistan, most recently stemming back to 1999. Al-Qaeda and the Taliban worked together in an attempt to overcome the Afghan government. The removal of a stable government combined with the ongoing war efforts and international intervention has led to ongoing violence and instability in the country. Afghan people are now considered the second largest refugee population in the world.


Poor Economy

The unstable government is unable to protect and grow the national economy leading to less opportunity for Afghan citizens within the country.

War

As the government continued to deteriorate, there became less security and an increased number of threats to the country.

*these are basic rations refugees receive weekly, some additions of ingredients below can be made depending on region:

Salt (unlimited)

Hot drink (12oz.)

Protein (4oz.)

Vegetable (6oz.)

Milk (7oz.)

Piece of fruit (4oz.)

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
Refugee families undergo RSC Africa
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Referrals are approved for resettlement to the United States. Refugees receive cultural orientation and language training based on their resettlement location.

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Resettlement: The 1st 90 Days

Days 1 & 2

- -Meet client at the airport
- -Provided warm, culturally appropriate welcome meal
- -Brought home to clean, safe, furnished and provisioned apartment or house
- -Home visit by Case Manager within 24 hours of arrival with home orientation

Week 1

- -Intake @ Resettlement Agency
- -Applying for Social Security Cards
- -Applying for Public Benefits
- -Applying for Cash Assistance
- -Follow up on immigration documents; Green Cards & EADs

Weeks 1 & 2

- -Enrollment in Employment Program
- -Referral for Initial Health Screening & vaccinations
- -Enrollment in ESL

First 30 Days

-Enrollment of school aged children
-Completing health assessment & vaccinations
-Selective Service Registration
-30 day Second Home Visit with Case Manager

First 90 Days

-Attend 2 days of Cultural Orientation





In order for a refugee to become a citizen, he or she must be in the United States for at least 5 years.

Normally, the refugee can count his or her date of entry into the United States as the first date of their permanent residence as long as he or she is successful in receiving permanent resident status.

The time that the refugee spends in the United States as a permanent resident will go toward the five years' requirement for naturalization. This means that if a refugee spent five years in the United States as a refugee before applying for permanent residence status, he or she will have met the five-year requirement. This allows him or her to then apply for naturalization once permanent residence is approved.
